NEGOTIATING A POLITICAL NIGHTMARE

*NAVIGATING THE INTERSECTIONALITY OF

Hyphenating Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2019, National Population Register and National Register of Citizens has become the latest legitimate expectation of the populace. The legal discourse around this theme has been attenuated by singularizing a class of citizens, making religion a marker of identity and rewriting the conundrum of who can be represented as a persecuted minority. The apex court has also been cautious on granting a stay to the law in question. Resistance has become a common standard through protests and movements to raise voices from public spaces as an affront to state and civil liberties. A macro issue of this magnitude demands a critical investigation from multiple viewpoints but should also make an attempt to centralize around using law as a political project for state subjects.
